Dear Parents,

General Information

Summer Camp Hours of Operation

8:30 AM - 5:30 PM

Tuition:

This year, children will have the option to be registered for 9 full weeks of Summer Camp or 5 full weeks of Summer Camp. A non-refundable registration fee of \$95 will be due at the time of registration to secure your child's spot for both the 9 Week and 5 Week packages.

Tuition is paid through an auto-draft system. Once you are registered, you will need to immediately fill out an auto-draft authorization form. If you sign up before May, your first payment will be drafted by May 1st. If you sign up after May, your first payment will be drafted within two weeks of receiving your form. **You can find the form on the website.** If you have more than one child signed up for camp, just fill a form for one child and we will make copies according to the number of siblings.

9 Week Package

The 9 week package will cost a total of **\$1,553**. This is equivalent to approximately **\$172.50** per week of tuition.

• The payments for the 9 week package will be scheduled in advance in three installments. The first payment of \$517.66 will be due on May 1st. The second payment of \$517.66 will be due on June 1st. The third and final payment of \$517.68 will be due on July 1st.

5 Week Package

- The 5 week package will cost a total of **\$888**. This is equivalent to **\$177.60** per week of tuition.
- The payments for the 5 week package will be scheduled in advance for three payments. The first payment of \$296 will be due on May 1st. The second payment of \$296 will be due on June 1st. The third and final payment of \$296 will be due on July 1st.
- If choosing the 5 week package, you will need to choose at registration which weeks of summer camp your child will be attending.
- As a reminder, the registration fee will be \$95 per child and will be due at the time of registration to secure your child's spot. Registration fees are non-refundable.
- Active members of Augusta Road Baptist Church will receive a 15% discount.
- Children will be more than welcome to attend for as few or as many of the 9 or 5 weeks as needed, but all families will be required to pay the full standardized price for their selected level of care.

• If you have any concerns about your ability to pay the above predetermined balances on the set due dates, we will be happy to work with you on establishing the best possible arrangement. Please be sure to communicate concerns of this nature with Leah Meahl.

Transportation:

Our Summer Camp Program uses 3 Augusta Road Baptist Church buses and one van. The drivers for our program are at least 25 years of age, have clean driving records, and are trained to drive the vehicles.

Child Pick-Up Policy:

Only authorized persons will be allowed to pick up your child. When someone other than a parent or legal guardian is to pick up your child, you must inform the After School Director in writing or call the office staging permission for alternate pick up. When calling, the person must already be listed on your child's record as someone who is authorized to pick up your child. Picture identification must be presented when the counselor in charge of pick up does not know the person picking up your child.

Drop-off and Pick-up Procedures

Drop-off and Pick-up in the line that is at the curb closest to the glass doors. Counselors will be there to greet you and usher children to and from the building. If you're picking up before 3:00pm, you will need to ring the front desk. We will provide two car tags with your camper's name on them to aid in pick-up authorization.

Late Pick Up Fee:

Our Summer Camp program closes at 5:30 PM. A late fee of \$1.00 per minute will begin at 5:31 PM if your child has not been picked up. If late pick up occurs more than three times, there will be a \$100.00 fee, which must be paid before your child will be readmitted. If this becomes a persistent problem, your child will be dismissed from the program.

Health and Wellness Policies

Sickness:

The After School program will only accept children that are healthy and well each day. If symptoms of illness are observed, such as fever, vomiting or upset stomach, the parent/guardian will be contacted. Care will be given until prompt pick up arrangements are made. The student should not return to the program until all danger of contagion is past.

If your child is a rising 1st graders, we highly recommend leaving a spare change of pants and underwear in case of a bathroom accident. Spare clothes will be stored in the Director's office for the duration of camp.

Medication:

Prescription drugs and other medications required for a child must be in the original container and clearly labeled with the child's name and dosage schedule. Written directions for administering the medication signed by the parent/guardian are also required. All medication will be secured in Ms. Leah's office and be administered by a counselor. If your child has asthma or is allergic to bees or stinging insects, etc., please make sure you provide us with an epi-pen, inhaler, or other medication that your child may need.

Injuries and First Aid:

The program staff have CPR/First Aid certifications. Our facility keeps and maintains first aid kits on premises and in our vehicles. In the event that a child sustains a minor injury (cuts, scrapes, bruises, stings/bites, etc.), we will treat them using our training and the first aid materials on hand (bandages, antibiotic ointment, ice packs, etc.).

If a child is more seriously injured, we will contact the parent/guardian and provide care to the best of our ability until prompt pick-up arrangements can be made. In the case of a possible concussion, or other head related injury, we will provide care based on the American Heart Association's first aid handbook. Please be advised that, in accordance with Augusta Road Baptist Church policy, the parent/guardian must arrange for immediate pick-up in the case of a suspected concussion or head injury in order to seek the appropriate medical attention. If the parent/guardian does not arrange for pick-up, we will contact EMS for emergency transportation. We will ride with the child and meet the parent/guardian at the hospital. We take our children's safety very seriously and appreciate your understanding and cooperation with our policies.

COVID-19 Protocols

As your child's safety and wellbeing is our top priority, we have been working to ensure that ARBC is as safe as possible for this summer. Amid COVID-19 concerns, we have used the CDC, DHEC, AAP and DSS guidelines, along with the expertise of medical professionals and other licensed facilities. While our county is currently rated as a low transmission area, campers are not required to wear masks and socially distance. We will continue to follow the recommendations of these sources and if transmission rates rise to a high level in our area, we may need to make changes.

Behavior Challenges

We strive to offer a safe and loving environment for all children. Because of this, there are certain behaviors that will need to be addressed immediately. Disruptive and/or disrespectful behavior is not appropriate. This includes but is not limited to:

- Lack of respect for staff (i.e. talking back, verbal and/or physical abuse)
- Fighting and/or reckless horseplay/touching, can't keep hands to themselves
- Bullying
- Damage to any property
- Stealing
- Profanity
- Throwing objects (in anger, unruliness, and/or with the intent to injure others)
- Dishonesty

Should behavior problems arise, the following steps will be taken:

- The child will be warned not to repeat his/her actions. We will try to redirect when possible. More serious behaviors will warrant a conversation with either the Director and a phone call to parents.
- The child will be removed from the activity and will be asked to walk/run laps in the gym (if the issue is with excessive energy), sit out of the activity, or copy a sentence relating to the issue. The Director may give chores such as sweeping, wiping counters and windows should behaviors go unchanged. No other methods of discipline will be used.

Harmful Behaviors

 Any harmful behaviors to oneself or others will result in a phone call or conversation with parents. Repeated harmful behaviors after a child has been warned and parents have been consulted may result in a multiple day suspension or dismissal from the program.

Suspension

• If the Director suspends a camper for harmful behavior, parent's will be notified that they cannot drop off for Summer Camp for 1-3 days depending on the severity of the situation.

Dismissal of a Child:

The ARBC childcare program reserves the right to permanently dismiss any child if:

- The camper seems unwilling or unable to participate in camp activities.
- The parent/guardian does not abide by the policies and procedures of the program or displays a disrespectful demeanor toward the staff or other children.
- Fees/tuition have not been paid.
- A camper demonstrates harmful behavior to oneself or other campers.

It is the responsibility of the parent/guardian to read and explain these guidelines to the child so that they may understand the expectations set before them and prepare the child for a successful time with us.

These are the guidelines that our staff will follow. Circumstances may arise that will call for the director to determine which consequences will be implemented. Thank you for your cooperation and understanding concerning these behavior guidelines. If you have any further questions, please do not hesitate to call us!

Concerns:

If there is ever any problem with our service to you and/or your child please let us know immediately! In order for us to resolve any issues, we need to be made aware of them. Please feel free to find Leah in order to talk about any problems. We will do our best to make ARBC Summer Camp the best possible environment for your child and we always want our children and parents to feel comfortable reaching out to us.

Cell Phone and Electronics Policy:

We do not allow campers to carry around their cell phones or electronic devices (Cell phone, IPad, DS Switch, etc.) during the day. It is best if these items are kept at home. If electronics or cell phones are brought, they must be stored in bags. The Summer Camp staff is not responsible for any lost items. If you need to get in touch with your child throughout the day, please call the office at 864-232-2728. If you can't reach us there, please call the main office at 864-232-2712. On field trip days, campers may bring devices to use on the bus.

A Typical Day at Summer Camp

Assembly:

We gather as a camp at 9:30 AM each morning for fellowship, announcements, stories, and prayer.

Small Group Activity:

After assembly, the groups will be dismissed to engage in small group activities. That may include playing in the gym, going outside, doing a craft, etc.

Arts and Crafts:

At some point each day, campers will have a chance to create. This may come in the form of an individual craft or a group project. These crafts may be featured in our camp spaces or be taken home.

Lunch:

Lunchtime is at 11:30 AM every day. Lunches can be refrigerated and/or microwaved as needed. A packed lunch will be required unless informed otherwise.

Movie Time:

After lunch (at approximately 12:30 PM) the entire camp watches a movie in their specific age groups. Most of our movies are rated G or PG and are usually Disney, animated or live-action films. Our Olders group may watch a PG-13 movie like Harry Potter or Avengers. If you have concerns about certain movies or the ratings, please let us know and we will avoid these movies for your child. During movie time, the staff take lunch in shifts so that there are always staff available onsite to care for your child. If a child doesn't want to watch the movie, they can quietly read or color.

Camp Games:

All campers will gather in the gym for our camp games of the day. Ranging from our typical tag or dodgeball games, these camp-wide activities will go with our theme of the week.

Snack Time:

Snack time is at 3:00 every day. The children are offered a variety of snacks that rotate daily. A list of a few of the offered snacks can be found below. If your child has a food allergy that was not indicated at registration, please make sure to communicate with us prior to camp so that we can accommodate their dietary needs. If you do not want your child to consume sugary or salty snacks, please be prepared to send a snack specifically for your child.

Snack Examples:

- Pretzels/ crackers/ popcorn/Goldfish/Chips
- Apples/ watermelon/ bananas
- Rice Krispie Treats/ Pop tarts
- Cookies (Oreos/ Chips Ahoy/ animal crackers)
- Ice Cream/Popsicles (on special occasions), Yogurt

Devotions:

Every day at Summer Camp, the groups gather for devotion/discussion time. These devotions have been written by Leah Meahl and will discuss specific Bible passages that are related to our camp theme, Children of Faith.

Reward System:

This summer, our groups will have the chance to compete for points throughout our nine weeks. Our camp leaders will award points to individuals or groups based on participation, good behavior, winning games, memorizing Bible verses, etc. The group to have the most points by the end of summer will have a special field trip to Frankie's Fun Park in August/September. (Details subject to change). It doesn't matter if you chose the 5/9 package, if your camper is in the winning group, they will be invited to join us on the field trip.

Field Trips:

The individual groups will go on field trips one day per week. Little boys and girls (rising 1st and 2nd grade) will go on field trips together on **Tuesdays**. The middle girls and boys (rising 3rd and 4th grade) will go on field trips on **Wednesdays**. The older boys and girls (rising 5th through 8th grade) will go on field trips together on **Thursdays**. The field trip schedule can be found on the calendars, which will be sent out along with this handbook and will be available on our website.

Since a large portion of the field trips are water trips, please make sure that on these days, the campers have a bathing suit, towel, sunscreen, and a bag lunch. If your child cannot swim, please note it on their registration form as well as informing your child's counselor. Please send water bottles with your children on field trips.

Themed Weeks

Each week of summer camp will have its own dedicated theme such as sports, fashion, art, and competition. Crafts and activities will largely be associated with the theme of that week. Some activities will be optional, but we like to encourage campers to try new things and participate in something that they may not feel skilled at. Within these weeks are themed days when campers are invited to dress up or bring an item accordingly. To keep up with these days, please look at our camp calendar.

Examples of these activities include:

- Playing kickball
- Putting on a skit
- Taste tests
- Having a lip-sync battle
- Playing water games

If a camper truly doesn't want to participate in an activity, they will be asked to watch and cheer on their group.
